The month of February has been filled with many important annual milestones – it has been both exciting and busy! Not only did we turn a page on the calendar, but students also engaged in 100th Day Activities, planned for important guest speakers, and enjoyed many outdoor physical health pursuits, such as skiing and skating. Witnessing students as they followed their learning passions during scientific inquiry was also a personal highlight for me as I had an opportunity to be a judge at the District's Science Fair held in Fraser Lake. Students were so well spoken and thoughtful about their projects! It is evident that our schools are places where learning and having fun are nurtured at the same time.

SD 91 schools also took the opportunity to mark Pink Shirt Day on February 22nd. This day, which was inspired in 2007 by an act of kindness in small-town Nova Scotia, is now a national and international day to focus a spotlight on the effect of bullying in our schools and communities. The first Pink Shirt Day was inspired by two grade 12 students in Berwick, N.S., after a new grade 9 student at their school was bullied for wearing a pink shirt. Travis Price and Davis Shepherd positively influenced their peers to arrive the next



day in pink shirts in support of diversity, inclusion, and their new fellow student. Bullying is not only an issue with children and youth, but it can also be present within adult relationships. Racialized individuals and members of the LGBTQ2S+ community often face the greatest effects of bullying and harassment in Canadian society. I am proud that students in SD 91 were so intentional about wearing their pink shirts and, in some cases, they created and led anti-bullying learning opportunities for their peers. These efforts by youth (along with supportive adults in the district) are truly inspirational and help create safer spaces for each learner. They also provide further evidence that the Board's 2020-2025 SD 91 Strategic Plan goal to Honour Diversity is continually coming to life!

Indigenous Focussed Graduation Requirement – SD 91 Students and Staff Featured!

As part of B.C.'s commitments to truth, reconciliation, and anti-racism, the Ministry of Education and Child Care is implementing an Indigenous-focused

graduation requirement for all students starting in the 2023/24 school year. This change represents an important next step towards lasting and meaningful reconciliation, building on work to date to incorporate Indigenous content and perspectives into the provincial

curriculum, educator professional

development, and professional standards for certified educators in B.C. The new graduation requirement will provide all B.C. students with the necessary time and opportunity to develop deeper understandings of the experiences, cultures, and histories of Indigenous peoples in Canada, in support of the K-12 mandate to develop the Educated Citizen.

UPDATED ASSESSMENT AND REPORTING POLICY — UPCOMING ENAGAGEMENT

In 2016 the Ministry of Education and Child Care began implementing a redesigned provincial curriculum that is flexible, focused on literacy, numeracy, and the First Peoples Principles of Learning, and supports deeper learning through concept-based and competency-driven education. This educational shift to how and what students learn in the classroom required a corresponding change to student reporting policies and practices that are consistent throughout the province. Dedicated Parent/Guardian information will be available soon and school and district staff here in SD 91 will be supporting families as well as educators with information sessions in the spring. 
